Programming

Weekdays are structured in a style that listeners are familiar with. Aboriginal personalities, music, news and information... focusing on what is important and of interest to our listeners. The music, which consists of a blend of Aboriginal and Country, is an important part of the mix. Aboriginal and country music programming, mixed with news, weather and community announcements to help listeners start and keep their day on a positive note.

5th Element

This weekly program has been developed to appeal to listeners whose musical tastes include hip hop and urban music. This represents a format change during the evenings and is CFWE's effort to reach younger listeners and encourage them to consider CFWE as a resource for youth-oriented programs. The program showcases Aboriginal and Independent Canadian hip hop artists.

National Request Program

A sizeable portion of our listeners was raised listening to Classic country music. They also have friends and family throughout the country. With our ever-increasing reach, CFWE is capable of addressing this need. This request program is very popular, allowing listeners the chance to send out greetings or just hear their favourite song. The variety of music requested is limited, which indicates the dedications and greetings hold the most relevance to the listeners. Aboriginal artists are frequently requested, and their music is also included in the playlist.

National Aboriginal Top 30

The National Aboriginal Top 30 countdown is broadcast Saturday mornings on CFWE. The 2-hour program, produced through NCI in Manitoba, is an informal, yet professional, countdown of music by Aboriginal artists that are on playlists of several Native network radio stations (Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba). The music represents the latest and most popular offerings from Aboriginal country music artists in Canada. Produced promos have been added to our daily schedule during the week, which has helped increased listener awareness of the weekly program. The program is re-broadcast Sunday afternoons.

Hear tbeat of Nations Celebration Powwow

If you've wanted to go to a powwow but couldn't - here's the next best thing. Hosted by Adrian LaChance - this one hour program takes listeners through the cultural traditions and significance of the powwow. Listen to the power of the drum. The powwow music is contemporary and traditional and features some fo the best drum groups in Indian Country. This program is rebroadcast on the weekend and is available via podcast.

Phrase of the Week

Several language groups are prevalent in Alberta, all possessing various dialects. To encourage open communication and the sharing of language, irrespective of the listeners' location, **Phrase Of The Week** has been developed. **Phrase Of The Week** has evolved from **Word Of The Day**, which initially polled listeners to offer translations for everyday words. Most listeners who were asked for their impressions enjoyed the feature. It seems some listeners are self-conscious about speaking their language or their dialect on the air. In the interest of increasing listener participation, callers are asked for their first names only. Three phrases are chosen and announced as the Phrase Of The Week. Generally, these are common, everyday phrases (for example, "who turned out the lights?") Listeners are encouraged to call and translate the phrase(s) into their language. The goal is to allow listeners a chance to demonstrate how the language spoken in their area is adapting to modern circumstances. All participants will be entered into a monthly draw for a prize and the recognition of being Alberta's Translator Of The Month.

Stories of Our People

Sharing stories is a fundamental part of Aboriginal culture. These stories may include traditional teachings or simply life experiences – **Stories Of Our People** will always emphasize the importance of cultural expression. The length of the feature depends entirely on the story. Predominant Aboriginal languages include Cree, Nakoda Sioux, Chipewyan (and other Dene languages), Blackfoot and Michif. Listener feedback has been very encouraging; comments have included the listeners finding it useful in restoring their pride and identity as an Aboriginal person. Others have stated that although the culture presented may differ in some respects from their own, they have been able to apply the stories to their situation. Archived stories will soon be made available on our website.

One People, Many Lives

An open conversation with Aboriginal people who are making a positive impact in communities throughout Alberta. From culture to youth and education – people of all ages are shaping the future of Aboriginal communities.

Footprints

A weekly program has been created that profiles outstanding Aboriginal people who have made lasting contributions to their communities, but who have since passed on. Some are historical figures who have impacted contemporary life, others are contemporary figures who have left a tremendous legacy future generations.

Moose Call

During rutting season in the fall (September), CFWE hosts its annual **Moose Calling Contest**. Listeners are asked to give their best imitation of a bull, cow or calf moose. An extremely popular event, the feature allows for an entirely new level of artistic expression. This popular program rivals our request program for participation and has male and female listeners of all ages calling in over a week. Previous winners have been adults, although honourable mention went to a youth (8 years old) from northern Alberta. The winner received a gift package as well as bragging rights for a year. CFWE also uses social media to help select winners and further engage its audience. This feature provides content and fun NOT available on any other radio station or network.
